From The Principal

Inclusive Schools Grant

I would like to begin this week's edition by passing on my thanks to Mr. Hattwell, who late last week was successful in securing \$200,000 for Mulgrave Primary School under the Inclusive Schools Fund. This funding will enable us to create a large sensory garden in the space where the Year 6 portable used to sit. To be able to reclaim this space with such a massive project is a wonderful result and Mr. Hattwell's efforts in developing the grant application ensured a quality bid. The process has been a long one, stretching back to Term 1 and the competition was enormous with far more schools applying than grants awarded. In addition, MPS has received the highest funding possible under the Inclusive Schools Fund and I look forward to the positive impact the new play environment will have on our students' educational outcomes. In the meantime, we will now work with the Victorian School Building Authority on not one, but two projects to ensure that we can provide the best learning spaces possible for the students of MPS.

Colour Fun Run

Another great day, albeit a little on the cool side. The Colour fun Run has quickly become one of the most popular days on our school calendar and you can certainly see why. Again, Mr. Hattwell is to be thanked for a tremendous effort in putting the day together. The fun and excitement can only happen if dedicated staff put in the hard yards behind the scenes and no one does it better, although, I am starting to think it's just an excuse for the staff to blast me with water pistols and various colours. Of course, the fundraiser is about helping us to put resources into the classrooms where students need them. This year we have been able to increase our technology resources significantly and as mentioned during the assembly, we will be able to use the funds raised to fast track the installation of upgraded TV's which will replace the old whiteboards. As we continue to get closer to the end of the year, we will also be finalising quotes and the appointment a contractor to create a Covered Outdoor Learning Area (COLA) for the Year 5/6 classes. As we enter 2019, fundraising will focus on the new stadium, as we will need to fund specific wish list items such as air conditioning ourselves.

The original idea was to showcase the hard work of the students in a way that celebrates their achievements and brings the school together and it certainly was that and so much more. 


World Teachers' Day


This Friday is World Teachers' Day and I would like to acknowledge the amazing work of the MPS team. Having worked at many schools, I can say with great confidence that the MPS team is as dedicated and passionate as they come. We have an amazing group of teachers who continually hone their skills with a focus on continuous improvement. They go the extra mile to ensure that our students can enjoy a wide variety of activities and an engaging curriculum. The work they have put in this year alone has been hugely significant for the future learning outcomes of all students, as they have overhauled our entire curriculum mapping and developed new term units for the future, along with consistent planning documents so that even if they are away, the show will go on as planned. I simply can't thank them enough.

Parent Opinion Survey

The graphs below represent the percentage of parents who responded in a positive, neutral or negative manner in this year's survey. The horizontal black lines represent where we were this time last year and the coloured bars where we are now. All in all, the results are excellent and I would like to thank the parents who completed the survey for their support. Of course, there are a few areas that need our attention. The first is bullying, where 15% of families responded in the negative. Bullying is a challenge for every school and has been at the forefront of conversation throughout MPS this year. Often highlighting an area leads to a lower result come survey time, but we don't want to sweep issues under the carpet. In fact, parents recognise that the school is working to address any bullying issues and we will continue to do so. A lot of time and effort goes into a whole school response, but I would also like to remind families that my door is always open should there be a need. The second area to work on is the physical spaces we operate in. Obviously the school concurs with this assessment and is working towards rectifying these issues, not only in terms of the new building and play space, but also in terms of improving how we look after the school, which is currently being well led by our students as they work to reduce litter and might I say, the school is looking significantly better as a result. Onto the positives and the average positive response rate was 88% across the board, with 9% neutral and 3% negative. Whilst we may have missed the mark on one or two areas, in terms of general satisfaction the school received a perfect 100% response, as we also did in School Pride and Confidence. You can certainly see the pride the students and community has in our school through the events mentioned above and we hope to keep building on this area. I was also pleased to see strong outcomes in Promoting Positive Behaviour and Diversity, which supports the school's strong intent to support all students and families and goes someway to acknowledging that our school wide behavioural messages are being heard. Finally, another area of significant improvement is the perception of student motivation. This outcome has increased significantly over the last 12 months and it is evident in everything our students do. In 2019, one of the challenges of our next Annual Implementation Plan will be to capitalise on this and further develop student voice and agency.

Research from both nutritionists and family life professionals shows families who eat together more than four times a week, reap these benefits –

More nutritious meals and knowledge of basic cooking skills Opportunities to practice social skills and table manners Improved family communication A greater sense of community and family values Stronger family traditions

A University of Michigan study showed family mealtime was the single strongest predictor of better achievement scores and fewer behaviour problems.

Children who eat regularly at home:-

- are less likely to smoke, use drugs or alcohol
- perform better in school
- have a lower rate of teen pregnancy
- are less likely to develop weight problems

Food tastes better when you eat it with your family.


This year Miss Shaw and I started a cheerleading team. We both come from a gymnastics, cheerleading, and/or dancing background and thought we would give the students something new to try.





Extend OSHC at Mulgrave Primary School



Everyone seems to be settling back into a routine and engaged in the program activities with great interest!

Our "Extend a hand" community link program was launched last week. This year our focus is on our hard working farmers who are going through tremendous hardship due to drought. We are coming together as a community to support them. Since last week, extend children were involved in many different activities which encouraged them to learn the importance of our farmers and farming. We watched video clips on farmer's life and learnt how drought is affecting their lives and how they have very limited natural resources to live off. Through our water drop collage and raindrops sun catchers, children learnt how to be water efficient. We also encouraged children to show their gratitude through making cards and writing letters to them.

Our Pick a Stick gratitude team game was a fun way to learn to show appreciation to others.

Our sedimentary layers science experiment has given the children an opportunity to learn how sedimentary layers form.

In another experiment, children made a winch machine using recycle materials. In our specialist cooking activities, we made yummy strawberry tart and fruit Popsicle. In our other specialist activity Auslan, children are growing their interest in further learning.
