### From The Principal

#### Easter Hat Parade

There has been considerable discussion around the school community regarding this year's Easter Hat Parade. One of the issues we have is the capacity of the current hall. In short, we simply don't fit any more. The other discussion is the work required at home, which for some families can understandably be a challenge. To clarify, following a discussion with the students of 6S who voiced a strong opinion on behalf of their peers, this year's format will be a buddy activity, with grades paired up to support each other. This will ensure that the parade does not become too protracted and it will also provide students with a chance to work with children from other levels on a whole school collaborative (and fun) task. This does not preclude parents from elaborating on the buddy task, or even creating a new masterpiece with their child if that is their wish, but it does mean that for those who are not so inclined, the pressure is not on to make a hat. The school feels that this is a fair and balanced solution to the differing views within the community and hopefully, we will again come together as a community for a fun and enjoyable event where smiles are guaranteed! With this in mind, let me confirm that the traditional **Easter Hat Parade will go ahead on Friday April 5<sup>th</sup> at 9:15am**. At the conclusion of the parade, we will draw the Easter raffle. There will be no assembly to conclude the term however, with students being dismissed from their classrooms at 2:30pm.

#### Cyber Safety

Our Year 5 & 6 students undertook cyber safety training last week and following on from this, it is a good opportunity to remind students that if they see or read something online that makes them feel uncomfortable, it is important that they tell a trusted adult. During the session, it was revealed that approximately two thirds of senior students have social media accounts that should only be used by people who are 13 years or older. Whether this is by parent choice or a student has set up an account themselves, I would urge families to reconsider this choice. As a school, we will always support students when they face challenges, but I would ask parents to assist us in this regard by ensuring students are not exposed to the dangers of the internet too early. Dr. Michael Carr-Gregg has recently reminded parents, schools and students that it is important not to give internet scams and fads oxygen and that they should be ignored and reported to the proper authority. If you or your child come across any inappropriate content, it can be reported to <https://www.esafety.gov.au/>.

Further, I would remind parents that MPS has very strict filters to prevent inappropriate content getting through our servers. For example, a child would be unable to access radio station SEN, due to the gambling content on their site.

### Cyber Safety cont.

Should you have further concerns however, I would recommend booking in to Nazareth College's evening with Dr. Michael Carr-Gregg next Tuesday March 19<sup>th</sup> at 7pm. This is a free information session that will provide strategies to deal with your child's eSafety.

### Annual General Meeting

On Tuesday March 19<sup>th</sup>, beginning at 7pm, the school will hold its Annual General Meeting for 2019. At this meeting the annual report will be tabled and elections for office bearers for the 2019/20 School Council will take place. Once ratified, the annual report will be made available to all families and will also be made publicly available online. Any interested parents are most welcome to attend. The regular school council meeting will follow at the conclusion of the AGM. The finance sub-committee will meet at 6:30pm.

## FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE INFORMATION FOR PARENTS

Every Victorian child should have access to the world of learning opportunities that exist beyond the classroom. The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund helps ensure that no student will miss out on the opportunity to join their classmates for important, educational and fun activities. It is part of making Victoria the Education State and the Government's commitment to breaking the link between a student's background and their outcomes.

### CAMPS, SPORTS & EXCURSIONS FUND (CSEF)

School camps provide children with inspiring experiences in the great outdoors, excursions encourage a deeper understanding of how the world works and sports teach teamwork, discipline and leadership. All are part of a healthy curriculum.

CSEF is provided by the Victorian Government to assist eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps and sporting activities.

If you hold a valid means-tested concession card or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible for CSEF. A special consideration category also exists for asylum seeker and refugee families. The allowance is paid to the school to use towards expenses relating to camps, excursions or sporting activities for the benefit of your child.

The annual CSEF amount per student is:

- \$125 for primary school students
- \$225 for secondary school students

### HOW TO APPLY

New applicants should contact the school office to obtain a CSEF application form or download from [www.education.vic.gov.au/csef](http://www.education.vic.gov.au/csef)

If you applied for the CSEF at your child's school in 2018, you do not need to complete an application form in 2019 unless there has been a change in your family circumstances.

You only need to complete an application form if any of the following changes have occurred:

- new student enrolments; your child has started or changed schools in 2019 or you did not apply in 2018.
- changed family circumstances; such as a change of custody, change of name, concession card number, or new siblings commencing at the school in 2019.

Check with the school office if you are unsure.

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## Encourage kids to help at home (every day without pay)

**C**onfident kids are competent kids. Past experience has taught them that they can be successful. The easiest (and most neglected way) to help develop competency is to give kids opportunities to help out at home. Don't overburden them with jobs. Sensibly allocate chores according to their age, interests and study requirements.

Expect children and young people to help without being paid.

Provide pocket money, but avoid linking it to chores. Helping in exchange for money develops in children a notion of 'What's in it for me?', which is a self-centred view of life.

However many parents tell me that they can't get their kids to help unless they pay them. Those parents have made a rod for their own backs. It's time for a change of tune. Don't wait until they are old enough to help. Start now, regardless of age. Toddlers and teens and all ages in between should be expected to chip in and help.

### *Here are eight ideas to help you get your kids to help out at home without being paid:*



#### **1. Keep jobs real**

Kids can sense it when parents give them jobs to keep them busy. Make sure the jobs you apportion make a real contribution to their own the family's well-being.

#### **2. Balance the personal chores with family jobs**

Chores are generally divided into two areas. Jobs such as keeping a bedroom tidy benefits a child and jobs such as setting the table benefit the family. By doing this kids learn to contribute positively to family-life.

#### **3. Place more difficult tasks on a roster**

The children can refer to it when needed, which takes the load off you and removes the need to remind them. Rotate the unpleasant tasks frequently. And here's the key to making rosters work – place yourself on the roster too! Kids are generally more willing to help when you as a parent are involved.

#### **4. Use Grandma's principle to make sure jobs are done**

Grandma's principle means you do the less pleasant tasks first. That is, make sure jobs are finished before mealtimes or before starting pleasant activities such as watching television.

#### **5. Avoid doing jobs for children**

When children get the message that no one will do their jobs for them they will be more likely to help out.

#### **6. Show your appreciation for their help**

Make a fuss when they help so they know that their contribution to the family is valued. If you do it often enough they may even show their appreciation for all you do for them!

#### **7. Keep your standards high**

Don't accept half-hearted efforts or half-completed jobs. If you think your child is capable of putting the cat food back in the fridge and placing the spoon in the dishwasher then insist that he or she does just that, rather than leaving the cat food on the sink. A job properly done is valued in the world of work, which they will eventually enter.

#### **8. Rebrand the term 'chore' as 'help'**

The term 'chore' definitely has an image problem. Use the term 'help' as it is easier on the ear and really does indicate what you want from your kids.
