Over the last few weeks, I know that our students and staff have continued to work hard and have earned a well deserved break over the next two weeks. Staffing Update

With Ms Miller moving on we are pleased to announce that Mrs Viki Ali will be stepping into the office role. Viki has previously undertaken a similar role at her previous school, so will be able to hit the ground running. In the meantime, we are advertising for a new Education Support team member to replace Viki in the classroom.

Staffing Update 2

It is with a hint of sadness that I must inform our community that Mrs Kat Clark will be leaving us at the end of the term. Mrs Clark has picked up a position much closer to home and I know her new school is incredibly lucky to have her. Fortunately MPS has a ready-made replacement waiting in the wings. Mrs Michelle Ohia will take over the classroom effective from the commencement of Term 2. Mrs Ohia has been with us for several weeks now as we added an additional staff member to the team to plug holes caused by Covid absences and to cover other areas where needed. She has already spent time with the preps and is ready to take the baton. We will also look to replace Mrs Ohia with an extra teacher to continue to cover future unforeseen challenges.

Enrolments

A reminder for families that we would appreciate it if enrolments for prep 2023 could be lodged with the office as soon as possible. We are taking a significant number of enquiries again this year and it would be very helpful for our planning if we could have all local families enrolling by the end of April. Enrolment forms can be found via the school web site or if it's easier, we can send home a form with a sibling, just give the office a call to arrange it. Last year, the school received approximately 130 applications for enrolment and we can only take 66. In order to follow the selection priority order, we need to know how many in zone and sibling families are enrolling before we can offer places to those residing outside our area. This means we unfortunately cannot confirm places for out of zone enrolments until early term three. In zone and sibling claims will be confirmed as soon as possible after receipt of the form. Siblings living outside of our zone who do not get a form in on time cannot be guaranteed a place. This is in line with DET recommendations and reflects the fact that our school is now at full capacity.

Covid Update

Students and staff who have tested positive and completed their 7-day isolation period are not required to participate in the RAT screening for 8 weeks after their release from isolation. In addition, if a staff member or student has recovered from COVID-19, they aren't required to get tested or isolate/quarantine if re-exposed to a case within 8 weeks of ending their isolation period. After 8 weeks, they must follow the relevant advice depending on the type of contact you are.

Parent Helpers

MPS is open for the return of parent helpers in the classroom. You may have or will soon receive a message from your child's classroom teacher calling for help where parents are available. Parent helpers will need to provide their Working with Children card and a copy of their vaccination certificate prior to their first visit. They will also be required to sign in on the office iPad each time they visit. In early Term 2, we will offer some parent helper training sessions (which we had organised for this time last year). Reading at Home

As we approach the holidays, I wanted to take a moment to remind families of the importance of daily reading at home. All students should read every night as a minimum homework expectation. Of course, that doesn't have to be in one session and could be done over three ten minute bursts if it makes life easier, or by reading before bed. What matters is that reading at home becomes a normal part of everyday life. We know that reading over the holidays provides an advantage over those that choose not to, so we strongly encourage every child to continue to read for enjoyment throughout the holiday break.

Easter Hat Parade

The Easter Hat Parade is back this year. As part of our ongoing recognition of a broad range of cultures, students will still undertake activities in a similar way to how we honour Harmony Day, the Lunar New Year and other cultural festivals and significant days. Throughout the year the school will be seeking to highlight more and more days from differing cultures as we become a more multicultural society. There are so many wonderful celebrations and we absolutely want to honour our diversity and help all of our students to understand the importance of being an inclusive and respectful community. This year's parade will be held first thing Friday morning and all are welcome to enjoy the event, which will be held in the courtyard.

FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE INFORMATION FOR PARENTS

Every Victorian child should have access to the world of learning opportunities that exist beyond the classroom. The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund helps ensure that no student will miss out on the opportunity to join their classmates for important, educational and fun activities. It is part of making Victoria the Education State and the Government's commitment to breaking the link between a student's background and their outcomes.

CAMPS, SPORTS & EXCURSIONS FUND (CSEF)

School camps provide children with inspiring experiences in the great outdoors. Excursions encourage a deeper understanding of how the world works while sports teach teamwork, discipline and leadership. All are a part of a healthy curriculum.

CSEF is provided by the Victorian Government to assist eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps and sporting activities.

If you hold a valid means-tested concession card or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible for CSEF. A special consideration category also exists for asylum seeker and refugee families. The allowance is paid to the school to use towards expenses relating to camps, excursions or sporting activities for the benefit of your child.

The annual CSEF amount per student is:

- · \$125 for primary school students
- \$225 for secondary school students

HOW TO APPLY

New applicants should contact the school office to obtain a CSEF application form or download from the website below.

If you applied for CSEF at your child's school last year, you do not need to complete an application form this year unless there has been a change in your family circumstances.

You only need to complete an application form if any of the following changes have occurred:

- new student enrolments; your child has started or changed schools this year.
- changed family circumstances; such as a change of custody, change of name, concession card number, or new siblings commencing this year.

Check with the school office if you are unsure.

Encourage kids to be problem- solvers

When parents solve all children's problems we not only increase their dependency on adults but we teach kids to be afraid of making mistakes and to blame themselves for not being good enough. That's fertile ground for anxiety and depressive illness.

So, how can we raise kids to be courageous problem-solvers rather than self-critical scaredy cats? Here are six practical ideas to get you started.

Turn requests into problems for kids to solve

Kids get used to bringing their problems to parents to solve. If you keeping solving them, they'll keep bringing them. 'Mum, my sister is annoying me!' 'Dad, can you ask my teacher to pick me for the team?' 'Hey, I can't find my socks!' It's tempting if you are in a time-poor family to simply jump in and help kids out. Alternatively, you can take a problem-solving approach, cuing them to resolve their own problems and take responsibility for their concerns. 'What can you do to make her stop annoying you?' 'What's the best approach to take with your teacher?' 'Socks, smocks! Where might they be?'

Ask good questions to prompt problem-solving

A problem-solving approach relies on asking good questions, which can be challenging if you are used to solving your child's problems. The first question when a child brings you a problem should be: 'Can you handle this on your own?' Next should be, 'What do you want me to do to help you solve the problem?' These questions are not meant to deter children from coming to you; rather, to encourage and teach them to start working through their own concerns themselves.

Coach them through problems and concerns

So, your child feels she was unfairly left out of a school sports team by a teacher and asks you get involved. The easiest solution may be to meet with the teacher and find out what's going on. You may or not resolve the problem but in doing so you are teaching a child to become dependent on you. Alternatively, you could coach your child to speak to the teacher herself and find out why she was left out. Obviously, there are times when children need their parents to be advocates for them such as when they are being bullied, but we need to make the most of the opportunities for children to speak for themselves. Better to help your child find the right words to use and discuss the best way to approach another person when they have problems. These are great skills to take into adulthood.

Ali's Corner - Parents Spot



Prepare kids for problems and contingencies

You may coach your child to be independent – walk to school, spend some time alone at home (when old enough), catch a train with friends – but does he know what to do in an emergency? What happens if he comes home after school and the house is locked? Who should he go to? Discuss different scenarios with children whenever they enter new or potentially risky situations so that they won't fall apart when things don't go their way. Remember the Boy Scouts motto – be prepared!

Show a little faith

Sometimes you've got to show faith in children. We can easily trip them up with our negative expectations, such as by saying 'Don't spill it!' to a child who is carrying a glass filled with water. Of course, your child doesn't want to spill it but you've just conveyed your expectations with that statement. We need to be careful that we don't sabotage children's efforts to be independent problem-solvers with comments such as, 'Now don't stuff it up!' 'You'll be okay won't you?' 'You're not very good at looking after yourself!'

Applaud mistakes and stuff-ups

Would a child who accidentally breaks a plate in your family while emptying the dishwasher be met with a 'That's really annoying, you can be clumsy sometimes' response or an 'It doesn't matter, thanks for your help' type of response? Hopefully it won't be the first response, because nothing shuts a child's natural tendencies to extend themselves down quicker than an adult who can't abide mistakes. If you have a low-risk-taking, perfectionist, consider throwing a little party rather than making a fuss when they make errors so they can learn that

mistakes don't reflect on them personally, and that the sun will still shine even if they break a plate, tell a joke that falls flat or don't get a perfect examination score.

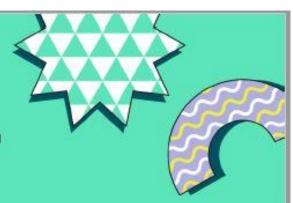

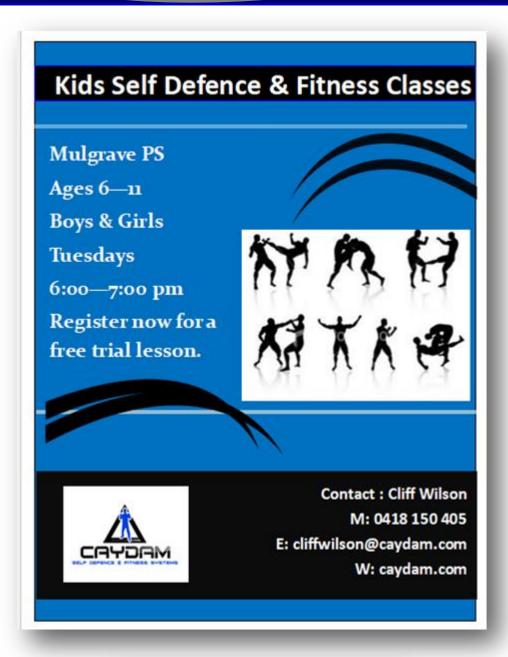
