
Education State Principals Conference 2022

Stronger Together: Every Student, Every School

Melbourne Convention and Exhibition Centre 30 - 31 May 2022

School Principals throughout Victoria came together to attend the Education State Principal's Conference on Monday 30th and Tuesday 31st May at the Melbourne Convention Centre. The two days were spent on exploring the research that underpins excellence in teaching and learning through the theme of "Stronger Together: Every Student, Every School". Of particular note was the presentation by Professor John Hattie on Day 1 who covered a range of issues, but particularly focussed on the impacts of Covid on student learning and how changes that were forced upon both students and schools have altered how students learn today. Professor Hattie noted that the evidence clearly shows a drop in student confidence. When you consider that when a student is a confident learner, they can learn at 1.5 x the normal rate, then having a lack of confidence can lead to students stagnating and even going backwards. Professor Hattie noted that following Covid, too many students are scared of taking on challenges. They would prefer to do what they already know, which is the exact opposite of what we want to achieve at MPS. Hattie challenged schools to work with students and help them understand that 100% on a test simply means that the student was not tested at the correct level. In modern education, tests allow teachers to identify what a student knows and what they need to work on next, or their "Point of Need". It is up to us as a school and as parents to allow students to fail. The fear of failure is stifling a student's ability to scale up their learning successes. In short, Covid has created a bubble where students do just enough and are therefore coasting.

So what is the solution? A significant component is helping students find their motivation, be more resilient and engaged with the curriculum. Motivation and engagement go hand in hand, but we need to create opportunities for students to want to learn. This is why schools like Mulgrave are asking students for input in the topics that they are learning and how they go about that learning. Otherwise known as student voice and agency, MPS is committed to teaching students how to seek help, how to cope and how to collaborate with their peers.



We know that student motivation drops from the beginning of schooling until approximately Year 10, when it takes a slight upturn. Along the way, students become more concerned about the validation of their peers than school work, the very definition of too cool for school. During Covid we did see some positive shifts for many students though. Many students, but not all, thrived with the opportunity to be independent learners. Some loved the application of technology and others liked being able to do their work in a timeframe that suited them. As a school, we must explore the best of a bad situation and use some of the new strategies gained to improve student learning outcomes. In the end, we don't know what we don't know, so there will always be a place for guidance to empower students to seek new learning. Throughout 2022 and over the life of our current strategic plan, staff will work towards helping students to set their own, realistic and challenging learning goals, whilst building our own capacity to be able to assess for differentiation and develop our teaching to ensure we are meeting each child's point of need. Of course, first and foremost we must build resilience, motivation and confidence so that our students can push themselves further. Through the Resilience Project we are helping create a safe learning environment where students can take on new challenges with the understanding that they may fail before they prosper, which is exactly what it takes to be a Motivated, Persistent and Successful student!

National Reconciliation Week

This week the school highlights **National Reconciliation Week** which began last Friday. National Reconciliation Week, Friday 27 May to Friday 3 June 2022, celebrates and builds on the respectful relationships shared by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people and all Australians. The dates commemorate and bookend two significant milestones in the reconciliation journey – the successful 1967 referendum and the High Court Mabo decision. As part of Reconciliation Week, students throughout the school will further explore reconciliation and indigenous culture.

Reminder: Student Free Day & PTS Conferences - June 23rd & 24th

The Department of Education have decided that all Victorian schools will hold a whole school professional practice day in Term 2 and have decreed that this will be an additional student free day at school, as a result of current teacher shortages. As mentioned in the last newsletter, a plan has now been approved by school council whereby this day will take place on Friday June 24th, the final day of the term. We have advised Camp Australia of the date and they will provide care on the day should families require it.

As such, the end of Term 2 for students will now be Thursday June 23rd at 1:30pm. The earlier finishing time will allow staff to conduct our parent-teacher-student conferences on the Thursday night, commencing at 2:30pm and running through until 7pm. Parents will be able to make conference appointments closer to the time. Conferences will be via Zoom to allow for the different needs of parents and their busy schedules and will run for 10 minutes.

DOGS AT SCHOOL POLICY

PURPOSE

To explain to our school community the rules and procedures we have in place in relation to dogs attending our school grounds.

POLICY

Assistance dogs

Mulgrave Primary School understands its obligations under the Disability Discrimination Act 1992 (Cth) and the Equal Opportunity Act 2010 (Vic) and will make reasonable adjustments for members of our school community with a disability who require an 'assistance animal' to help alleviate the effects of their disability. Assistance animals are permitted to attend our school with their handler. Our school Principal can lawfully ask a person to produce evidence that an animal:

- is trained specifically to assist a person alleviate the effects of a disability (e.g., seeing eye dogs)
- meets standards of hygiene and behaviour appropriate for a school environment.

We understand that in some circumstances, students may require an assistance animal to attend school to help them to participate in their educational program. Mulgrave Primary School will consider a request by a student with a disability to allow an assistance animal to attend school with them on a case-by-case basis. Pet dogs

Mulgrave Primary School is not a public place, and our Principal has the authority to permit or decline entry to school grounds and impose conditions of entry.

Dogs prohibited

Mulgrave Primary understands that many families in our school community keep dogs as pets, to ensure that our school remains a safe and inclusive place for everyone, pet dogs are not permitted on school grounds under any circumstances from Monday – Saturday. Dogs are permitted on Sundays at the Mulgrave Farmers Market between 8:30 am -1pm.

Our school community is diverse, and may include people that are allergic or uncomfortable around dogs. We are also conscious of the health hazards that may be posed by dogs. We ask that families please leave their pet dogs at home or safely tether them outside school grounds when attending our school or school events.

Stray dogs

Unaccompanied or stray dogs sighted at our school should be reported immediately to The Principal at the school office. School staff will contact municipal authorities and/or Victoria police for assistance in managing and removing a stray dog from school grounds, and ensure staff and students remain safe at school.

FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE INFORMATION FOR PARENTS

Every Victorian child should have access to the world of learning opportunities that exist beyond the classroom. The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund helps ensure that no student will miss out on the opportunity to join their classmates for important, educational and fun activities. It is part of making Victoria the Education State and the Government's commitment to breaking the link between a student's background and their outcomes.

CAMPS, SPORTS & EXCURSIONS FUND (CSEF)

School camps provide children with inspiring experiences in the great outdoors. Excursions encourage a deeper understanding of how the world works while sports teach teamwork, discipline and leadership. All are a part of a healthy curriculum.

CSEF is provided by the Victorian Government to assist eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps and sporting activities.

If you hold a valid means-tested concession card or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible for CSEF. A special consideration category also exists for asylum seeker and refugee families. The allowance is paid to the school to use towards expenses relating to camps, excursions or sporting activities for the benefit of your child.

The annual CSEF amount per student is:

- \$125 for primary school students
- · \$225 for secondary school students

HOW TO APPLY

New applicants should contact the school office to obtain a CSEF application form or download from the website below.

If you applied for CSEF at your child's school last year, you do not need to complete an application form this year unless there has been a change in your family circumstances.

You only need to complete an application form if any of the following changes have occurred:

- new student enrolments; your child has started or changed schools this year.
- changed family circumstances; such as a change of custody, change of name, concession card number, or new siblings commencing this year.

Check with the school office if you are unsure.
